

First, he didn't know what the source of Trump's information was. It wasn't until months later — in May — that Woodward learned it came from a high-level intelligence briefing in January that was also described in Wednesday's reporting about the book.

In February, what Trump told Woodward seemed hard to make sense of, the author told me — back then, Woodward said, there was no panic over the virus; even toward the final days of that month, Anthony S. Fauci was publicly assuring Americans there was no need to change their daily habits.

Second, Woodward said, "the biggest problem I had, which is always a problem with Trump, is I didn't know if it was true."

But why not then write such a story later in the spring, once it was clear that the virus was extraordinarily destructive and that Trump's early downplaying had almost certainly cost lives?

Again, Woodward said he believes his highest purpose isn't to write daily stories but to give his readers the big picture — one that may have a greater effect, especially with a consequential election looming.

Woodward's effort, he said, was to deliver in book form "the best obtainable version of the truth," not to rush individual revelations into publication.

And always with a particular deadline in mind, so that people could read, absorb and make their judgments well before Nov. 3. "The demarcation is the election.

Margaret Sullivan's Conclusion

I don't know if putting the book's newsiest revelations out there in something closer to real time would have made a difference. They might very well have been denied and soon forgotten in the constant rush of new scandals and lies.

Still, the chance — even if it's a slim chance — that those revelations could have saved lives is a powerful argument against waiting this long.




Chart of Flu, Pneumonia, Covid

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



Chart of Flu, Pneumonia, Covid







County Dashboard - Sept 14





Reopened May 8.

After Gov. Doug Ducey's stay-at-home order expired May 15, Arizona saw cases soar. In late June, Mr. Ducey, a Republican, announced that the state would "pause" operations of bars, gyms, movie theaters, waterparks and tubing rentals to contain the virus's spread, sparking lawsuits from some business owners. A court ruled that the state had to give businesses the opportunity to reopen safely, prompting Mr. Ducey to release guidelines on August 10 for "paused businesses" to follow in order to reopen. Reopened April 27.

Gov. Tate Reeves, a Republican, let the state's stay-at-home order expire April 27 and reopened retail stores, with some limits. All businesses were allowed to open in June, but in July Mr. Reeves said the state would pause a full reopening. As case numbers continued to climb, he tightened restrictions on social gatherings and bars statewide, and later issued a mask mandate. School reopenings were delayed for higher grades in certain counties. Read more »

Reopened May 4.

Gov. Ron DeSantis, a Republican, gradually reopened businesses in May, starting in Florida's less populous counties. As case counts rose through the early summer, Mr. DeSantis moved ahead with reopening, but in late June, the state effectively shuttered bars with an order ceasing on-premise alcohol consumption. In September, the state moved ahead with reopening, allowing bars to reopen and the final three counties — Miami-Dade, Broward and Palm Beach — to move into Phase 2 of reopening. Still, some local governments have decided to keep bars and nightclubs closed despite state permission to reopen. Read more »

Reopened April 24.

Gov. Brian Kemp, a Republican, went toe-to-toe with the White House and local mayors over his decision to reopen large parts of Georgia's economy ahead of other states. Mr. Kemp has continued steadily with reopening plans while case counts have trended upward, and he has firmly opposed recommendations for a statewide mask mandate. In mid-August, however, he amended an executive order to allow local areas to implement mask requirements. Read more >>>


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States Currently Covered by the Order

Travelers from the following states and territories should quarantine upon arrival in Chicago: Alabama, Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, and Texas. The list will be updated every Tuesday and go into effect the following Friday at 12:01 a.m.

Updated as of 9/8/2020

On Thursday, July 2, Chicago Department of Public Health Commissioner Allison Arwady, M.D., issued an Emergency Travel Order directing travelers entering or returning to Chicago from states experiencing a surge in new COVID-19 cases to quarantine for a 14-day period from the time of last contact within the identified state. This includes both Chicago residents returning from travel to a designated state, and travelers arriving in Chicago from a designated state. The Order went into effect on Monday July 6, 2020, at 12:01am. Below you will find answers to common questions regarding the Emergency Travel Order and how it applies to Chicago residents and visitors.







Q: How many contact-tracing cases can the health district handle at once? If even just 1 percent of UI students test positive for COVID-19 — that would be about 500 infections — would the health district be able to do contact tracing for all of them? Do you have enough personnel to handle such a scenario?

A: The National Association of City and County Health Officials recommends 15 contact tracers for every 100,000 in population.

The Champaign-Urbana Public Health District currently has 30 people trained and working as contact tracers. We are also in the process of adding an additional 15, through an agreement with the University of Illinois. They will help supplement our current contact-tracing efforts.



Contact Tracing - \$15 an hour




