
MAP 11.2 6 July 1863, evening.





MAP 11.3 7 July 1863.










MAP 12.1 8 July 1863. Meade approaches Lee through Turner's, Fox's, and Crampton's Passes.









Two U.S. Cavalry divisions repulsed five rebel cavalry brigades in a day-long fight north of Boonsboro on July 8, 1863. The South Mountain passes remained open to the Federal Army in pursuit of the Confederates retreating from Gettyburg via Hagerstown to Williamsport.




MAP 12.3 10 July 1863.








MAP 12.2 10 July 1863, dawn to noon.








Major Harman builds a pontoon bridge at Falling Waters, using lumber from demolished Williamsport warehouses which had been hauled downstream.









MAP 13.1 Darkness, 13 July 1863, to dawn, 14 July 1863. Lee evacuates Williamsport. Ewell's Corps and Stuart's cavalry brigades cross the Potomac River at Williamsport Ford. Longstreet's and Hill's Corps follow the trains of the army and Ewell's artillery across the pontoon bridge at Falling Waters.






