News of the Week: Deputy Secretary of State Wendy Sherman's visit to the Indian subcontinent demonstrated that in the wake of the withdrawal from Afghanistan, the United States has decisively downgraded its relationship with Pakistan. India, however, looms ever more important in American eyes, despite its ongoing *Modification*. "We don't see ourselves building a broad relationship with Pakistan," Sherman stated bluntly in Mumbai. The reasons for this foreign policy shift are geostrategic as well as economic, and the consequences will be far-reaching. News of the Week: in the Czech general election, the country's billionaire prime minister, populist Andrej Babiš (on right), was unexpectedly defeated by the center-right Spolu alliance, which has announced coalition talks with a left-liberal party, Piráti-STAN. Immediately thereafter, President Miloš Zeman (on left), Babiš's political patron, was taken to the hospital, apparently gravely ill. He is now in an ICU



Petr Fiala (below), Spolu's leader and a former political science professor, is expected to take over as prime minister. If Fiala forms a government and, as now appears likely, President Zeman leaves the political scene, this will have far-reaching repercussions not only for Czechia, but also the EU and NATO. In addition, such a development would reverse the trend toward populism in postcommunist Eastern Europe. Babiš's defeat may be related to last week's release of a new tranche of Pandora papers. Note that in the years to come, further releases are expected



Like previous pontiffs, Pope Francis is the best-known religious figure on the planet. And btw, he leads the world's oldest institution



Francis's pontificate is distinguished by his innovative stance on a variety of controversial issues. He is anxious to strengthen the Church both as an institution and a living, evolving community of faith. The changes he has introduced should be viewed not from a doctrinal perspective, but from that of pastoral care: the Church extending the sacraments to a larger number of the faithful. A canny political operator, the pope is skilled at using the press and social media to put his message across; and at hinting and intimating, rather than making formal pronouncements, in order to move things in the direction of change. We can expect that this is the terrain on which battle will be joined by reformers and conservatives within the Church in the years to come

- "If someone is gay and seeks God and has good will, who am I to judge?"
- Abortion is a grave sin but absolution may be granted to repentant women.
- Favors extending communion to divorced persons and remarried couples: "They always belong to the Church."
- Regarding people who die in a state of mortal sin, reportedly stated, "Those who repent obtain God's forgiveness and take their place among the ranks of those who contemplate him, but those who do not repent and cannot be forgiven disappear. A hell doesn't exist, the disappearance of sinning souls exists."
- Role of women in the Church must be expanded.
- Has become increasingly proactive in addressing the issue of child sex abuse by priests.
- Strong advocate of fighting climate change
- Modest personal arrangements: Francis is the first pope in more than a century to forego living in Vatican's Apostolic Palace

News of the Week: the Nobel Peace Prize committee splits the difference by naming as laureates journalists Maria Ressa (Philippines) and Dmitry Muratov (Russia) "for their courageous fight for freedom of expression in the Philippines and Russia. At the same time, they are representatives of all journalists who stand up for this ideal in a world in which democracy and freedom of the press face increasingly adverse conditions"



Anti-Nazi journalist Carl von Ossietzky, who received the 1935 Nobel Peace Prize. Arrested after the Reichstag fire in 1933, he was severely tortured in Esterwegen concentration camp and died in 1938. Ossietzky's 1931 conviction for revealing Germany's secret rearmament was upheld by Germany's Federal Court of Justice in 1992



Like Ossietsky, Ressa and Muratov personify the intersection of investigation, reportage, and public advocacy that will increasingly impact public events in the future. MSNBC and Fox News, take note! Donald Trump, Philippines president Rodrigo Duterte, and other "hot" populists creatively channel their publics' anger by giving it voice. So does Greta Thunberg



Thunberg may be a "hot" charismatic, but she is unusual because she developed her extraordinary public appeal when she was still a child. Here we see her addressing the United Nations Climate Change Conference in Katowice, Poland, in 2018. At the time she was 15



Since then she has made a number of well-publicized speeches to spread her global ecological message while renewing, in ritual and even sacral form, her connection to a younger generation of supporters. Thunberg's most famous public appearance to date was at the United Nations Climate Action conference in 2019. The Covid-19 pandemic served to draw attention away from Thunberg and her cause, but now she is once again at the center of public attention



Thunberg's mainstream climatological stance

Note that in her United Nations speech, Thunberg did not go beyond the sustainable development goals formulated by the United Nations Climate Challenge Conference in 2015. Both then and since, in the substantive part of her message she adheres closely to the scientific consensus on global change. It is the tone and the visuals that are startling and, yes, mobilizing

A Twitter spat between a septuagenarian and a teen. There could be no doubt who would emerge as the winner

Trump's first Thunberg-themed tweet, which followed her United Nations address, was meant to be mocking: "She seems like a very happy young girl looking forward to a bright and wonderful future. So nice to see!"

After *Time* magazine made Thunberg its Person of the Year Trump decided to be more direct.

Trump: "So ridiculous. Greta must work on her Anger Management problem, then go to a good old fashioned movie with a friend! Chill Greta, Chill!"

Thunberg: "A teenager working on her anger management problem. Currently chilling and watching a good old fashioned movie with a friend." The Children's Crusade of 1212 aimed to establish a second Kingdom of Jerusalem in the Holy Land. The crusade was led by two young boys, Nicholas of Cologne, a German, and Stephen of Cloyes, a Frenchman. The movements grouped under the rubric of Children's Crusade included both minors and adults. Within a couple of decades, it became the stuff of legend



Thunberg's mother, Malena Ernman, is an opera singer and actress, while the activist's father, Svante, is an actor and producer. Her younger sister, Beata, enjoys a burgeoning reputation as an Instagram influencer, though her main focus is on music





Build back better. Blah, blah, blah. Green economy. Blah blah blah. Net zero by 2050. Blah, blah, blah. This is all we hear from our so-called leaders. Words that sound great but so far have not led to action. Our hopes and ambitions drown in their empty promises. [...] They've now had 30 years of blah, blah, blah and where has that led us? We can still turn this around – it is entirely possible. It will take immediate, drastic annual emission reductions. But not if things go on like today. Our leaders' intentional lack of action is a betrayal toward all present and future generations.


...although for reasons of class and style her appeal is largely confined to residents of the global North



Thunberg's apocalyptic messaging is effective. On the other hand, she fails to acknowledge the successes of the global environmental movement such as the reduction in the ozone hole over the Antarctic, which is anticipated to close in 2050. As a latter-day prophet, she relies on her personal and emotional appeal rather than detailed scientific analysis; and on instilling in her constituency a sense of dire urgency

Thunberg has declared she would never buy new clothes. Some of her behavioral and representational patterns such as an extreme bluntness of speech and a studied disregard for appearances evoke the medieval cultural model of the holy fool. These figures would act as moral judges of a corrupted and unjust society and make cryptic or prophetic pronouncements. Thurberg, of course, is not cryptic — far from it — but prophetic she most certainly is!



St. Augustine of Hippo distinguished between moral evil, derived from human free will and disobedience, and natural evil, which resulted from the loss of order in the world stemming from the first sin. It is human nature, however, to elide the distinction


Vienna's famous Pestsaüle, or Plague Column (also known as the Trinity Column) was erected to commemorate the victims of the 1679 plague epidemic
