- 1. Kerry Emanuel, What We Know About Climate Change (2nd Edition **2018**, MIT Press, 93pp) Short, simple review of the science. Probably underestimates climate sensitivity.
- Robert Henson, The Thinking Person's Guide to Climate Change
 (2nd Edition 2019, American Meteorological Society, 550pp)

 Authoritative review of science and policy.
- 3. Lawrence Krauss, The Physics of Climate Change

(*Due* Feb 9 **2021**, Post Hill Press, 208pp)

Science at a layperson's level, no policy. Author is a particle physicist, not a climatologist. Looks worth investigation, based on Table of Contents.

4. Bill Gates, How to Avoid a Climate Disaster: The Solutions We Have and the Breakthroughs We Need (*Due* Feb 16 **2021**, Knopf, 272pp)

From the title, appears to focus on amelioration strategies.

Advocacy:

In such a complex and fraught domain, it can be difficult to keep one's bearings. The reader is advised to keep a salt shaker handy. Facts can be cherry picked. Hopefully, this course will help sort it out.
