Romantic Era

The era begins with the <u>1827</u> début in <u>Paris</u> of the ballerina Marie Taglioni in the ballet *La Sylphide*, and to have reached its zenith with the premiere of the divertissement *Pas de Quatre* staged by the Ballet Master Jules Perrot in <u>London</u> in <u>1845</u>.

Ballerina as a central part of ballet.

A slow decline. Arthur Saint-Léon's <u>1870</u>
ballet *Coppélia* in <u>Paris</u> is considered to be the last work of the Romantic Ballet.



What are the 7 characteristics of Romanticism?

- Picturesque. imagery describing an old object.
- Primitivism. nature is better than society.
- Sentimentalism. strong emotion.
- Supernatural. interest in unrealistic and mythical things.
- Nature. the love of nature.
- Nationalism. the arts were about heritage and customs.
- Melancholy.

Key themes of the Romantic Period

- Revolution, democracy, and republicanism.
- The Sublime and Transcendence.
- The power of the imagination, genius, and the source of inspiration.
- Proto-psychology & extreme mental states.
- Nature and the Natural.

Romantic Ballet Era Timeline

- 1828 Marie Taglioni debuts at the Paris Opera.
- 1840 Fanny Elssler tours America; congress convenes to watch.
- 1849 Jules Perrot made *Premier Maître de Ballet* of the St. Petersburg Imperial Theatres.
- 1858 Arthur Saint-Leon replaces Perrot as head of the Bolshoi.
- 1869 Petipa becomes Ballet Master in Chief to the Imperial Tsar.
- 1870 Petipa replaces Arthur Saint-Leon as director of the Bolshoi, for 30 years.
- 1885 Lev Ivanov made Assistant Ballet Master to Petipa.
- 1892 First performance of *The Nutcracker* at the Mariinsky Theatre in St. Petersburg.

Salle Le Peletier (1821-1873) Home of the Paris Opera.

Her Majesty's Theatre (1705 - Present)

London.

It plays host to the heyday of the era of the romantic ballet.

It continues to host major performances, currently showing 'The Phantom of the Opera'.





Swan Lake (1895)

Ballet may have been invented in Italy and France but it was refined and invigorated in Russia.

Peter the Great (1672-1725), expended Tsardom to a major European power. Led a cultural revolution with modern, scientific, westernised and based on Enlightenment.


Found St. Petersburg, capital till 1917.

Ballet not as to entertain, but to cultivate a new Russian people.

Imperial Ballet School in St. Petersburg (1738)

Marius Petipa (1818-1910)

- The most influential ballet master and choreographer.
- Created over 50 ballets.
- _*Premier Maître de Ballet* of the St. Petersburg Imperial Theatres from 1871 until 1903.
- Premier danseur at the Grand Théâtre in Bordeaux
- _Premier danseur at the King's Theatre in Madrid
- _Premier danseur at the Imperial Theatres of St. Petersburg
- _Served the Imperial Ballet for 56 years.

Padded toes.


Strong feet and ankles.







Romantic era ballet characteristics:

Soft, rounded arms and a forward tilt in the upper body. This gave the woman a flowery, willowy look. Leg movements became more elaborate due to the new tutu length and rising standards of technical proficiency.

Common Elements of Romantic Ballet:

Not about mythological gods and goddesses.

Show local or national color in costumes, settings, and dances such as mazurkas and waltzes.

A supernatural, fantastic, exotic, or spiritual element is usually prominent.

Ballet technique is a focus, especially pointe.
