

THE SECOND TROUBLES (1922–1972)

The 1922 Petition for Home Rule rejected by Unionists

Acceptance of 1922 Partition in Ulster

Unionists/Protestants → moral high ground

Nationalists/Catholics → subversion

Anti-Catholic discrimination in Ulster

Catholics excluded from political power

9,000 Unionist votes → 12 councillors

14,000 Nationalist votes → 8 concillors

Economics: acceptance of modernization

CONSEQUENCES

- Bloody Sunday = point of no return
- Provos' recruitment increased
- British Embassy in Dublin burned down
- Bloody Friday in Belfast 1972: 26 IRA bombs
- The Shankhill Butchers versus IRA car bombs
- Summer 1969: 2700 British troops in NI
- Summer 1972: more than 30,000
- Stormont dismantled



OFFICIAL VERDICT

- The Widgery Report (1972): a whitewash
 - Believed the military
- The Saville Report (2010): the truth
 - The marchers posed no threat and did not deserve to be shot at
 - Lt. Col. Wilford directly responsible
 - Maj. Gen. Ford selected I Para and shares responsibility
