The time and place of The Dead

- Set in Dublin on January 6, 1904
- The annual party hosted by the Morkan sisters to celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany.
- You will be introduced to a crowd of people, so be prepared for that.

Epiphany

- Feast of the Three Kings and the recognition of Jesus's divinity
- In Joyce's work: a sudden, brilliant insight that reveals a previously unknown truth.
- The film closes with Gabriel's epiphany, which is about Ireland as much as it is about Gabriel.

Settings in The Dead

- The interiors were shot in a warehouse in Valencia, on the I-5 north of Los Angeles.
- But the exteriors really are Dublin.
- The Morkan house is, as specified in the original story, 15 Ushers Island, on the south quays of the River Liffey, at the James Joyce Bridge (opened in 2003) to Blackhall Place.
- Other genuine Irish locations include the Halfpenny Bridge over the Liffey; Temple Bar; Anglesea Street and Henrietta Street.
